

I look forward to seeing where God will lead us together in 2022 and for the next 30 years!



In the village of Bokimai, the lack of clean water available was creating many issues.

Now, there is a clean water well at the local church!

Bokimai is located in Tabaka Division, Gucha South Sub County, Kisii in Kenya. The well has brought excitement to both the community and the church. 87-year- old, Mary, used to rely on her grandchildren to help her fetch water from the local stream. Her grandchildren wouldn't be able to get home from school to assist her until late in the evening, meaning she couldn't access water for domestic use all day long.

Now, she has clean water right outside her door step. In just five minutes, she can draw water to use together with her 90-year-old husband. Mary shared, "For this water, I say thank you so much. I am glad we will be getting clean water closer to home going forward. I am so happy, God bless you."

followup visits

cultivating relationships

The Hunger to Harvest ministry has trained tens of thousands of men, women and children in the life-saving skills of food sustainability, but we don't stop there.

Training is crucial, but so is follow-up. The success of the communities we work with is exponentially increased as long-term relationships are built and subsequent training is available.

One such visit in Gumongo, Ghana brought together 44 people who were full of appreciation for the HHI survival garden training. Many of the trainees had already harvested their vegetables and were preparing for the dry season farming.

One attendee shared with James, HHI's Hunger to Harvest trainer, that he had previously dropped out of school because he couldn't afford the school fees. He said, "I never respected farming until the day I attended your program. Glory be to God! Farming has liberated me from my struggles. I thank you very much." Currently, he has over 130 raised planting beds while caring for his mother and younger siblings.

Another attendee, Zacchaeus (pictured left), was drying his peppers and okra during the visit. He shared, "I have already sold a large quantity. Thank you for the training and the love that you have shown to us."





Patience, Joyline, and Chipo are three of the nine incredible women who comprise the Kubatana Peanut Butter Coop in Chigadora, Zimbabwe. Kubatana means "together" which is a fitting description for this dedicated group of women.

Through a grant from the Women of Hope ministry in 2019, this group was able to purchase machinery to begin processing peanut butter to sell in the local markets. At the end of 2021, Women of Hope Director, Alisa Van Dyke, had the opportunity to spend the day with these inspiring women making peanut butter.

"They had a contagious joy as they went about their work," says Van Dyke. "I was so encouraged by the confidence they radiated as they showed me each step of the process ...true professionals."

Ngonidzashe, HHI's Women of Hope Coordinator in Zimbabwe, had the opportunity to spend three days with this group in 2021 conducting business training including how to form a village savings group. Since that time, the ladies have formed a savings group and held two meetings.

precious moments

Last December, a few members of the HHI team traveled to San Marcos, Honduras, to spend a week with our friends at Mission Lazarus. Over the course of several days, the team distributed MAGI boxes to churches and schools throughout the southern mountainous regions. Each stop was special, but there was one particular location that grabbed the team's attention.

The group made their stop near a creek to meet the local minister and children. Upon arrival, they were perplexed as there was no church or school anywhere in sight. The group soon realized that the rough terrain made the path inaccessible. Because of this, the children had walked over 20 minutes just to meet them and receive their MAGI boxes. In this extremely remote location, the HHI team was reminded that they were beautifully isolated from the rest of the world. For most of the children, this pocket of Honduras was all they had ever known, yet they were humbly grateful. HHI is consistently reminded that it's through your thoughtfulness and generosity towards MAGI that precious moments like these are possible!
